Personal journeys

I am personally on quite a journey right now. Trying to discern what is most appropriate in terms of moving house and relocating. Big life decisions here! For I, like many of us, are growing older, and how do we each do that with agency and at the right time?

So – a bit of honesty here – I rattle around in a five-bedroom house with a large garden. Which was fine when I and my husband were bringing up children and hosted a myriad of Church and community activities. But is no longer fit for purpose – or, at least, my purpose or destination. This lovely house needs to pass on to a family who will enjoy and cherish it.

Letting go is not easy but sitting lightly is fundamental to our faith. In that we only sojourn wherever we are – journeying is inevitable. Whether that journeying is for reasons of employment, vocation, life decisions, health... or whatever. I confess I have struggled with this but, somewhere along the line, I have come to realise, accept, and embrace that I am moving. And am beginning to find that exciting!

While moving may not be everyone's defining issue, the sense that how we live life has to change and that we have to embrace those changes is something recognisable to people both at the beginning of their adult life or towards the end. Readers of this may be in their 20s or 80s but there is an inevitable provisionality about how we live in this century which none of us can escape. There are no certainties – and probably never were. How to navigate and flourish? This week, as the state pension rose by 8.5%, commentators were remarking that for this generation of pensioners there is more stability than will be evident in the future. Some of you who read this will be just those pensioners – others will be at the start of working life or, indeed, still students. With a hugely different future ahead. Both life expectations and how we navigate is hugely different across generations. Let's recognise that and learn from one another.

For my part, I have to discover the best practical solution for the next phase of my life. But I also recognise the need for future generations to flourish. That requires not only personal decisions – like how I support my grandchildren through university or other pathways – but also how my voice contributes to national decision making around a myriad of issues – from the future of the NHS right through to how we develop ways of living together which enable all communities to thrive.

What do thriving communities look like in practice? In this 21st century world the jury is probably still out. But scroll back to first century Palestine and the early Church and you get some sense of how we might live life well together. And not just as Christian community but, rather, welcoming and embracing those who might join us in our journeying.

In this fractured world, where people seem to set themselves one against another on edge, and where peace is hard to find, how might we live the vocation to walk lightly against the backdrop of huge change – whether it be AI, climate change... or whatever? For that is surely our calling – and one to be embraced whichever generation we are from. Surely the times they are a-changing (to coin a well-honed phrase from my youth) but, if we are truly Christian, how are we called to run with that? Alongside the Son of Man who, unlike me in my house moving, had no place to lay his head.



Prayer Thoughts

Allelulia! Allelulia! Allelulia! Christ is RISEN. He is risen indeed! Allelulia!

Hello, hello, hello!

I do hope you had the most marvellous Easter!

Once upon a time, a long, long time ago now, I used to believe that every day was "holy", a gift from God, and therefore each was pretty much the same. As a family, we did celebrate Easter and even Christmas' but not to any great degree, like George Fox, considering such events as "contrivances of man", and at best a distraction. However, since joining the Cathedral and sort of becoming an Anglican² my view has changed markedly, and no more so than at Easter. The dramatic events, the theatre of the Triduum, the turning of darkness into glorious light, along with the wonderful liturgy and music³ (not to mention the prosecco!) have blown me quite away. So much so that we cut short our holiday on the wonderful Isles of Scilly to attend!



The highpoint of the Triduum for me is the Saturday night vigil with the lighting of the Paschal candle (well done Karen – it wasn't easy in that breeze!) and the first celebration of Easter Day with Jesus rising majestically from the grave. Death into Life! Darkness fleeing from the Light. This is not good news; it is the best possible news ever, not only in the history of the world but also in the history of the Universe! A once only never-to-be-repeated event that changes, transforms everything! **4**

I have not yet seen Iain McKillop's exhibition, Stations of the Resurrection, in the Cathedral but other artists down the centuries have had a field day with these events. The image above comes from the huge pages of the Sherborne Missal (c.1399–1407) illustrated by one John Siferwas (interestingly a Dominican!), with script by John Whas in the Benedictine Abbey in Dorset. (It can now be found in the British Museum and online⁵). Jesus, still bleeding from his wounds and still wearing his crown of thorns, is rising from a pink tomb despite the presence of the (drunk?) soldiers and one dog.

But it is the two images right that I should like to focus on.

You will have seen both images of the Anastasis (or Resurrection) before. The one on the left is a mosaic from St Mark's basilica in Venice, the one on the right from the Chora in Istanbul. Both show Jesus plucking Eve and

Adam from the power of death, much to the amazement of the onlooking patriarchs, prophets and apostles. On the left, we can see Jesus is trampling on death! As Karen wrote in this newsletter a couple of weeks ago, the Life of God in all its fullness and all its beauty is unstoppable!! Love wins.

We don't talk enough about the Resurrection. It should somehow be the symbol of our faith, not the cross. Both of course are indispensable. But it is the Resurrection that brings us hope and joy and new life.

When I was growing up, another "R" word was all the rage, namely Revolution.⁶ You hardly hear revolution mentioned





anymore. The dreams of revolution were completely consumed by rampant capitalism and individualism – and to our considerable loss in my opinion.

But the Resurrection of Jesus continues to inspire, young and old, of all tribes and tongues, of all possible people groups, to look up, beyond ourselves, to receive from the "firstborn among the dead", so that we can stand before the Father holy, without sin, without shame and without reproach (Colossians chapter 1). It really is a pretty good deal!

Let's finish with the blessing from the Saturday night service!

Allelulia! Christ is risen. He is risen indeed. Alleluia.

God the Father, by whose love Christ was raised from the dead, open to us who believe the gates of everlasting LIFE. Amen.

God the Son, who in bursting from the grave has won a glorious victory, give us JOY as we share the Easter faith. Amen.

God the Holy Spirit, whom the risen Lord breathed into His disciples, empower us and fill us with Christ's PEACE. Amen.

May this life, joy and peace be among us and remain with us always. Amen!
