Pray Your Part

I have just returned from a lovely week in Berlin where we enjoyed cycling around the city which, among other things, was preparing to host the European Football Championship. We watched as the giant goal between the Reichstag and Brandenburg Gate was erected. I was fascinated to discover that the wall that divided the city between 1961 and 1989 also ran so close to these two iconic locations.

Even more prominent in street decoration were the posters and talkboards for myriad candidates in the European Elections. In fact, we were stopped in the street early on Saturday morning by people with home-made Pro-Democracy banners who urged us to use our vote. They were very concerned about the rise of the far right in their 21st century Germany. We had to repeatedly explain that we were British and couldn't vote in the European elections because we were no longer part of the EU. Still, they implored us to vote for democracy.

May I too, encourage you to exercise that democratic power that you have, to have your say? If you are unsure if you are eligible or registered to vote you can find all the information you need on this **government website**. The deadline to register to vote is next Tuesday at 11.59pm. What is different for us since May 2023 is the need to take photo ID with us when we vote, so don't forget!

There are plenty of sound bites, public debates, phone ins, social media posts and even manifestos to read as we think through the issues that matter most to us as we vote in this year's election. Jude Taylor, our Discipleship Officer, is planning on offering an informal conversation about the Church's resources and the role that politics plays in our discipleship. Watch this space!

There is also an invitation from the bishops of the Church of England to encourage prayer and participation in the life of our nation and communities, both as voters and as citizens. **Pray Your Part** is a 21-day journey of prayer and reflection (from Friday 14 June until Election Day on 4 July) designed for use in the run-up to the UK General Election. Each day explores a different theme, with a short Bible reading, reflection, and prayer for a different aspect of our common life.

'First of all then I urge that... prayers, intercessions and thanksgivings should be made for everyone, for kings and all who are in high positions, so that we might lead a quiet and peaceable life in all dignity'.

1 Timothy 2.1-4

The bidding prayer for Day One is 'Your Kingdom Come'. The Archbishops write

'As followers of Jesus, we should always be guided by what we see and understand to be God's purposes for the world. Whatever party we support, our vote is an expression of this. Across the political spectrum, we

believe that those who offer themselves for public office need and deserve our support and our prayer. In fact, the Bible urges us to pray for those who make difficult decisions on our behalf; who shoulder great burdens; who, we pray, will carry out their duty with integrity and compassion. So let us vote, and let us pray for all those who are standing for election and for the future of our country'.

Guide the leaders of the nations that they may work for the common good, and strengthen our hearts with a vision of your kingdom. Here us, good Lord.

Cathedral wins Visitor Experience award


The 14 winners of the Your Leicester Awards have been announced, with Leicester Cathedral winning Best Visitor Attraction!

Manuela's final services in Leicester will be on Sunday 28 July 2024, with the Cathedral Eucharist at 10.30am and the St Nicholas' Eucharist at 6.30pm.

She will be licensed in the Diocese of Southwark on Sunday 15 September 2024 at 6.00pm at St Margaret's Church. Manuela would love to welcome anyone who wishes to support her on that day – invitations will be sent with more details to be announced closer to the time.

LCR Update

Progress on Building Works

Recent progress on the Heritage & Learning Centre (HLC) extension includes completing the carpentry and boarding out of the main roof areas in preparation for lead work that will commence shortly to provide full protection and weather proofing.

Work continues installing the external stonework to face the reinforced concrete frame, using a durable light Northumberland Buff sandstone.

The steel uprights visible in the photograph will support the 'veil' of moulded glazed terracotta fins.

A breakthrough from the Cathedral into the HLC at the east end of the Great South Aisle was created some time back and work has now started to form a proper opening that will be completed with large oak doors.

Internal partitioning is continuing along with mechanical and electrical work.







Prayer Thoughts



I recently attended a Christian session about sustaining the spiritual atmosphere in the family. The talk aimed to understand the essence of spirituality in a godly home and to unravel God's will for the family as the smallest unit of the Church.

In the talk, some scriptures were discussed, Zachariah 7.12 said that the Lord had scattered the Jewish ancestors to Babylon because of their spiritual sclerosis, hardening of their spiritual hearts, and that the disease may be hereditary. But God who examines the hearts said in Hos. 6.6, "I delight in loyalty rather than sacrifice and in the knowledge of God rather than burnt offerings".

In the Christian circle, it is a popular saying that "the spiritual controls the physical" — anything that has to do with man starts in the spiritual realm before manifesting physically. It is, therefore, very important to keep the family altar alive to sustain the spiritual atmosphere in the family (2 Tim 1.5). Zechariah said to check our

spiritual health to make sure that we don't drift from "inward reality to outward religion."

Sustaining a spiritual atmosphere in the family in today's world, where so many activities occupy our time, can be challenging, and it will be interesting to know how Christian families achieve this. In my family, we endeavour to close the day with a night prayer together as much as possible. This has led to small talks about the day's challenges, learnings, and joys. Some suggestions that were highlighted during the talk are:

- Praying together as a family
- Reading and discussing the scripture together.
- The discussion leads to Godly counselling for each other.
- Reflecting on our lifestyle as parents and what it says about us to our children.
- Creating a Godly atmosphere by respecting each other, listening to Godly music, etc.

I think that it's important to surround ourselves with people stronger in faith than us. Nobody can pour from an empty cup. If you don't have a way to fill your cup continuously, you will soon run dry and into problems.

Part of how I do this is by joining a 6.00am Bible Study Zoom Call. The call is attended by priests and church leaders; therefore, there's a lot of goodness, and when I'm facing a challenge either at work or at home, by the time I listen to the teachings of the Bible, it puts things into perspective. The word of God is powerful, and no other words could ever offer the spiritual sustenance that it offers.

It's important to normalise by practising Christian practices in the home frequently. Creating and sustaining a spiritual atmosphere in our homes increases our ability to handle any challenges we may encounter. It helps us recover from hurt and daily bruises that we encounter in life.

A sustained spiritual atmosphere in the family promotes greater peace and calmness, more fulfilling lives and better family relationships to the glory of God.

Amen.
