Unintended consequences

This month has seen me diving ever more deeply into issues around homelessness. Rebecca Pawley, the Homelessness Charter Project Worker, has moved on to another organisation, so before the Charter Management makes decisions about future directions, I've been buzzing around both getting under the surface and pushing things along.

Whichever issue I'm running with - and while there are issues very specific to each topic – there are some common threads which lead me to muse on how systems work in our society. Then, as a Christian, and in particular with Sunday's Gospel in mind – Jesus quoting Isaiah in the synagogue in Nazareth 'the Spirit of the Lord... has appointed me to bring good news to the poor... release to the captives... recovery of sight to the blind... let the oppressed go free'. I have to ask myself how what I am noticing sits with that vision of God's now and future Kingdom.

One of the common threads I notice is the invisibility of marginalised people. We have seen this politically, where people feel disenfranchised or not heard, either because of their circumstance or lifestyle or just because they live a world away from the centre of power. I notice this invisibility in the way systems work – for example, no address can result in no access to mainstream support just at the point you need it most.

Another common thread I'm witnessing are unintended consequences. So, for

example, there is relief if a prisoner released from jail has a home to go to – but what are the circumstances of that home and the impact of his returning on those who already live there. Sensible procedures don't always result in good outcomes for all concerned.

And then there's the lack of joined-up-ness. Don't get me started on that! You've probably all got experience here – when you are personally dealing with different arms of the NHS, for example. I have two delightful 'cuckoos' living with me at the moment – homeless grandson and his heavily pregnant partner. They really are struggling to join dots between housing and the DWP.

Christ followed that reading from Isaiah by saying 'Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing'. Yes, this is about his coming as Messiah but its also about his teaching and living out a different model of community, not only where all are included but also with mutual accountability. My examples lie far from his vision but there are things I can do to begin to fulfil that prophecy. And we can all, as individuals and within our community, play a part in giving voice to and supporting initiatives, organisations and movements which take that holistic vision seriously and break down barriers.

In all of this we need, though, to be humble in the work of co-creation with people of lived experience. So at the Cathedral in our work of worship, welcome, and witness – what does it feel like to be on the receiving end? What could we do differently to avoid unintended consequences, ensure voices are heard, dots are joined, and all included?

LCR Update

Building works approaching completion

As the scaffolding comes down, the new **Heritage & Learning Centre** (HLC) is slowly emerging. The external stonework façade, 'veil' of moulded glazed terracotta fins, and copper roof parapet look splendid.

Within the HLC, work is focused on the internal finishes – the sweet chestnut panelling in the first floor **Learning Space** works beautifully and this also features on the ground floor and stairwell.

Inside the Cathedral the new internal south lobby is almost complete. This will provide a better, more welcoming visitor entrance through the Vaughan Porch, along with vital weatherproofing during cold and windy weather.

With the building works approaching completion my role at the Cathedral will come to an end shortly, so this will be my final update.

Thank you for your interest in Leicester Cathedral Revealed and your support for the project. I'm sure, like me, you are looking forward to the Cathedral fully reopening in the spring.

It's been a long road with plenty of challenges along the way, but I'm sure it will be well worth the wait and all the hard work!

Leicester Cathedral Revealed has repaired and restored the Cathedral building, securing the fabric for the long term and the new Heritage & Learning Centre will provide exciting and much needed new spaces and facilities.

The Cathedral will be renewed so it can be its very best as a place of worship, heritage, pilgrimage, hospitality, learning, sanctuary and celebration.

Medieval Women Forging the Way

Influential Women of the Sikh World and Beyond

Recently displayed at Bosworth Battlefield Heritage Centre, this exhibition explores the close historical links between the Battle of Bosworth and the beginnings of the Sikh faith in Punjab – and has been brought to life thanks to Leicestershire County Council's Culture Leicestershire team and a local Sikh women's group.

Whilst much is known about the powerful women of the War of the Roses, the group has used extensive research, stories, and images to explore their medieval peers in Punjab and the paths they forged for generations of Sikh women around the world, dating back to 1469.

New life from old stumps

Prayer Thoughts



Dear Friends,

If you've ever walked through a garden, forest, or park, you may have come across a tree stump – a silent reminder of what once was. Its trunk, branches, and leaves are long gone, and all that remains is a scarred remnant. To the casual observer, it might seem lifeless, forgotten, and useless. And yet, sometimes – if you look closely – you see a tender green shoot emerging, defying expectations and breathing life into what seemed dead.

Isaiah 11.1 offers us this beautiful image: "Out of the stump of David's family will grow a shoot. Yes, a new branch bearing fruit from the old root." The prophet Isaiah spoke this at a time when Israel felt like a felled tree – cut

down, broken, and lifeless. There was loss, there was failure, and there was despair. And yet, Isaiah delivered hope: from the barren stump would come something new and unexpected. Not a mere sprout, but a branch – full of promise, strong enough to bear fruit.

I wonder how many of us feel like those stumps today. Perhaps there's an area of your life where you've been cut down – dreams that didn't materialize, relationships that feel broken, or seasons where everything seemed to stop growing. Sometimes, when we look at our circumstances, it feels like the story is over, like there's no room left for life or hope.

But the message of Isaiah, and

indeed the promise of God, reminds us otherwise. God specializes in bringing life where there seems to be none. He can cause growth in the most unlikely of places. What feels like an ending to us may just be the beginning of something new and beautiful.

Consider the stumps in your own life – the places that feel barren, abandoned, or hopeless. What would it look like to trust that God can bring a new shoot of life there? That even now, hidden beneath the surface, the roots are still holding strong, and God is preparing something new to break through?

In Jesus, we see the ultimate fulfilment of Isaiah's words. He is the shoot from David's line, the branch that bears fruit for all of creation. He came into a broken and barren world to bring life and hope, and He continues to do so today.

If God can bring new life from a seemingly dead stump, what might He be growing in you during this season of waiting? The next time you see a stump, let it remind you: God is still at work.

Prayer Pointers

- Pray for areas in your life where you feel stuck or hopeless. Ask God to give you eyes to see where new life might be breaking through.
- 2. Pray for patience as you wait on God's timing. Waiting, though difficult, can be fertile ground for growth.
- Pray for those around you who are struggling to see hope. May they be reminded of God's power to bring life where there seems to be none.
