The Cathedral's aims and objectives

The Cathedral is the seat of the bishop and a centre of worship and mission.

The Cathedral's role in the Diocese

The Bishopric and Diocese of Leicester were founded in 1926. Its boundaries are almost coterminous with the counties of Leicestershire and Rutland with the city of Leicester at its heart. The Rt Revd Martyn Snow, previously Bishop of Tewkesbury who was appointed to be the 7th Bishop of Leicester, taking up office on the 22 February 2017. During 2017 a new Suffragan See of Loughborough was created and the Rt Revd Saju Muthalaly was appointed to this role on the 25 January 2022. A new Loughborough Cathedra was commissioned from furniture maker Luke Hughes which the bishop uses when they are present in the Cathedral. The Cathedral is the focal building for the Diocese and used for major Diocesan services such as ordinations and confirmations.

The Cathedral, DBF and DBE staff, along with the Cathedral song school are accommodated in St Martins House, adjacent to the Cathedral. Along with the co-located offices and conference facilities, St Martins House includes an Outreach Centre which accommodates work including the Street Pastors, Family Contact Centre and the Welcome Project which began under the Cathedral umbrella. These activities are overseen by the Canon Missioner. The driving aims of St Martins House are generous hospitality, attentiveness to God and transforming relationships. Initially 50% of the previous year's operating surplus of St Martins House was given to the Cathedral — from 2021 this was replaced by an annual grant paid by the DBF which amounts to £25,000. This concurs with the original vision to provide support for the Cathedral's Ministry and it now also recognises that the role and status of the Cathedral is a significant asset to the ongoing success of St Martins House.

All the Cathedral clergy serve across the diocese and aim to be out in parishes at least one Sunday/month. Canon Alison Adams, is also the Diocesan Social Responsibility Enabler and the Cathedral provides office space and hosts workers in this field. The Dean serves on the Bishop's Leadership Team and attends the Bishop and Archdeacon's meetings.

The Cathedral's approach to fundraising

Funds are raised to support the current requirements of the Cathedral. In order to do this, a professional fundraiser is used who complies with all relevant codes of practice. Fundraising activities on behalf of the Cathedral are subject to regular review by senior management and no fundraising complaints have been received. A fundraising policy is in place.

All reasonable care is taken to ensure protection of the public, including vulnerable people, from unreasonably intrusive or persistent fundraising approaches, and undue pressure to donate.

How the Cathedral is governed and managed

Status

The Cathedral is established as an Ecclesiastical Corporation under the Cathedrals Measure (1999), comprising the College of Canons, the Council and the Chapter. The Chapter is the Governing Body and consults with the College and Council as required by the Measure. It has charitable status by virtue of the Measure and is regarded by HMRC as a charity for tax purposes, but is regulated by the Visitor (the Bishop) rather than the Charity Commission.

The Chapter

Under requirements laid down by the Church Commissioners under the powers given to them by Section 27 of the Cathedrals Measure 1999, the Cathedral is the seat of the Bishop and a centre of worship and mission. In particular Chapter is responsible for:

- Preparing and publishing an annual report and audited accounts which give a true and fair view
 of the financial activities for each financial year and of the assets, liabilities and funds at the end
 of each financial year of the Cathedral and its connected entities
- Stating that they have complied in all material respects with these regulations or describing which recommendations have not been complied with and giving reasons for their noncompliance
- Selecting suitable accounting policies and then applying them consistently
- Making judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent
- Preparing the accounts on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Cathedral will continue in operation
- Keeping proper accounting records from which the financial position of the Cathedral can be ascertained with reasonable accuracy at any time, and
- Safeguarding the assets of the Cathedral and taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The Chapter meets on at least nine occasions in each calendar year. It currently comprises seven lay people and four clergy and is chaired by the Dean. New members of Chapter receive an induction that includes the responsibilities of Chapter and their authority under the constitution and attendance at a national training day.

The College of Canons

The College consists of equal numbers of diocesan clergy and lay people appointed by the Bishop of Leicester. Its role is consultative. It also has a formal role in the election of the Diocesan Bishop. The College elects one of its members to the Chapter. Some members of the College volunteer to assist with work to strengthen the capacity of the Chapter to support and develop the musical life of the Cathedral.

The Cathedral Council

The Council is an advisory and consultative body, established to support the work of the Chapter and to ensure accountability to the wider community and diocese. It provides a sounding board and guidance for Chapter as well as offering an informal 'watchdog' role to ensure the Cathedral fulfils its legal responsibilities. It also has the formal role of decision making should an amendment of the Cathedral's Constitution and Statutes be proposed. With the development of the Leicester Cathedral Revealed Project (LCR) a member of Council has been appointed to the Project Board to strengthen scrutiny and compliance.

The Finance Committee of the Chapter

This Committee is responsible for advising the Chapter in connection with its responsibilities in the field of financial and investment management. Members are selected for their financial or investment experience. The committee reviews quarterly management accounts and the annual budget.

Audit & Risk Committee

This Committee is responsible for assisting Chapter in the discharge of their responsibilities for accounting policies, risk management, internal control and financial reporting, including liaison with the auditors.

Risk Register

The Cathedral Administrator holds responsibility to ensure that our compliance list for Chapter covers a range of items to ensure that they were reviewed regularly. The Risk Register is discussed at Chapter and the Executive review this and report back to Chapter. The Risk Register is an annual feature on the Chapter agenda for an update and for risks to be discussed.

Investment Powers

Under the Cathedrals Measure the Chapter currently invests the Cathedral's funds in Funds administered for the Central Board of Finance (CBF) of the Church of England by CCLA Investment Management Ltd, and a balanced portfolio with Brewin Dolphin.

Safeguarding

The Cathedral Safeguarding policy is based on that of the Church of England and is reviewed annually. The Cathedral has a Service Level Agreement with the Diocese so that the Diocesan Safeguarding Adviser acts as the Cathedral Adviser. The Dean chairs the Cathedral Safeguarding Group whilst the Canon Pastor leads the operational work of Cathedral Safeguarding.

Leicester Cathedral Charitable Trust Registered No. 1152990

The Leicester Cathedral Charitable Trust was registered on 22 July 2013. This Annual Report and Accounts covers the period from I January 2022 to 22 December 2022.

Objects

The object of the CIO is, for the public benefit, to promote, aid and further the objects and work of the Church of England by supporting the work of the Chapter of the Cathedral Church of St Martin in Leicester including but not limited to:-

- i) the provision of a fitting place of interment for the human remains of King Richard III of England and associated religious facilities and activities and the repair, maintenance and renewal of all such provisions and facilities; and
- ii) the preservation, maintenance and development of the Cathedral Church of St Martin in Leicester generally.

The Trustees meet regularly to have oversight of its fundraising activities and annually to receive the report and accounts.

Leicester Cathedral Music Foundation Registered No 1164872

The Leicester Cathedral Music Foundation was registered on 15 December 2015. This Annual Report covers the period from 1 January 2022 to 31 December 2022.

Objects

The Objects of the CIO are, for the public benefit:

- 1. The advancement of education in music by, but not limited to:
 - i) The granting of scholarships and bursaries to musicians, choristers and choirs;
 - ii) The provision and maintenance of music, musical instruments and other facilities for providing music;
 - iii) The training of musicians and choristers; and
 - iv) The provision of musical and choral education in schools, churches and the wider community; and
- 2. The advancement of the Christian religion in accordance with the precepts of the Church of England.

The Trustees meet regularly to have oversight of its fundraising activities and annually to receive the report and accounts.

Group Report

Review of 2022

The Mission of the Cathedral is to be 'a beating heart in the city and county' through three strategic activities: Worship, Welcome and Witness.

In January 2022, the Epiphany Sunday services were the last to be held in the Cathedral building. The Cathedral underwent a complex decant with much of the furniture and effects being placed in storage, and operational materials being relocated to St Martin's House. The building was subsequently handed over to contractors for the internal works of the Leicester Cathedral Revealed (LCR) project to commence. Therefore, the Cathedral was closed to visitors and for worship throughout the year with its reopening planned for November 2023.

Cathedral worship continued to be offered with Sunday morning services being held in the Grand Hall of St Martin's House, and the daily offices, Choral Evensong and Midweek Eucharists were offered in St Nicholas Church, Leicester, 4 minute walk from the Cathedral. Key Diocesan services remained the responsibility of the Cathedral team – the Canon Precentor, vergers and volunteers – but were relocated to churches across the Diocese. For example ordinations were conducted at St Margaret's Leicester and St Mary's Melton Mowbray and the Chrism Mass at St James the Greater in Leicester. A Welcome Service for the new Bishop of Loughborough, The Rt Revd Saju Muthalaly, was held in Brockington College in February. Most of the civic services took place in another neighbouring parish, St Mary de Castro, including Justice Services for two High Sheriffs and the Civic Service to welcome the new Lord Mayor of Leicester. The Cathedral also played a significant role in the drumhead service held in Green Dragon Square on Armed Forces Day and in the Annual Service for the Royal Tigers' Association held at the Arch of Remembrance in Victoria Park

The Cathedral worked closely with The Lord-Lieutenant to hold a Service of Thanksgiving for the Platinum Jubilee in June in St Mary de Castro Church, and then in September, following the significant moment of the death of her late Majesty The Queen, a Service of Commemoration and Thanksgiving for Her Late Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, at St James the Greater Church. The Cathedral also held a Service of Prayer and Reflection in St Mary de Castro Church two days after the Queen's death. Attendance at most services continued to grow as the months of lockdown and reluctance to venture into public spaces receded. It is fair to say that Sunday morning attendance over 2022 went down perhaps by a third, with a number of people moving to worship in their local parish churches and churches which offer the traditional feel, but we also noticed a number of new people joining our Sunday services.

The 'Together With Leicester Cathedral' initiative led by the Canon Precentor Emma Davies and Head Verger Bev Collett was launched with an offer to parishes across the Diocese to invite the Cathedral clergy and choir for Sunday afternoon services or other festivals. This collaboration was a huge success with visits to 24 parishes from every corner of the Diocese and across a breadth of theological positions on average twice a month in term time. Most services were Choral Evensong but other services included two All Souls' Services, Advent and Christmas Carol Services and a Confirmation service. We marked our connection with Richard III at the visits to Sutton Cheney near the Anniversary of the Battle of Bosworth and to St Mary de Castro on the anniversary of Richard's birth. The Cathedral was mindful of being 'good guests' and worked with local parishes to create authentic services which attracted hundreds of people together to worship. This was received very warmly in parishes, with the choirs enjoying a high standard of hospitality and cake, together with new congregations to sing with and for. Visiting different churches including those in rural contexts was an exciting adventure for the choristers. Conversations built relationships and clergy were intentional

in listening to the mood music of parishes as they experience significant change through the Diocesan Shaped By God Together process. The success of this initiative is such that it will continue when the Cathedral re-opens. All these collaborations have enriched relationships, and created real visibility for the Cathedral. One person remarked of Together With, 'This is the best thing the Diocese have ever done for us!'

2022 was a year of consolidation and growth for the Cathedral choirs, still rebuilding their strength following the pandemic. The Cathedral continued to resource four separate choirs, supported by adult singers: Junior Girls, Boys, Senior Girls and Young Songmen. During the year three Choral Scholars joined the 'back row'. DioSing continued to be delivered well in local schools and the Music Department was successful in gaining some grant money from the Cathedrals Music Trust and elsewhere which enabled many of the young singers to access free singing lessons. Auditions held in local schools resulted in some new recruits and the experience of singing in different church settings while out of the Cathedral building helped the choirs to develop their confidence and repertoire.

The ministry of Welcome flourished in a number of ways despite the absence of day to day visitors. A number of Cathedral volunteers have offered more time to the King Richard III Visitor Centre where the Funeral Pall was relocated during the closure: others have offered signposting at a Welcome Desk initially located in the St Martin's House Foyer and which found a home in the No.7 Cafe. Volunteers also attended to vulnerable people who made their way to St Martin's House with the Cathedral being closed. A significant number stopped volunteering at the Cathedral but Volunteer Manager Rebecca Hale worked hard and maintained in contact with most.

Holding Sunday morning services in the less formal setting of ST Martin's House with a three sided seating plan changed the dynamics of the Sunday congregation who were able to physically see each other in a new way. Community events increased with regular pot luck lunches, discipleship conversations after the service facilitated by the Discipleship Officer Jude Taylor, and regular social events. Organized refreshments at midweek and Sunday services, made a real difference. The congregation grew more ethnically diverse and opportunities for widening participation were developed as an expression of the Cathedral's welcome.

Led by Canon Pastor Alison Adams, pastoral work and safeguarding remained robust and person centred. While we can never guarantee we hear and respond to all situations, the pastoral team is organized and has its antennae tuned both to congregational members and the wider community.

Safeguarding (and indeed health and safety) procedures clearly required adaptation for moving out of the building and using other spaces but team leaders tackled this challenge with a will. While we have been working with a reduced volunteer workforce, with few opportunities for newcomers to join in, we retain a robust approach to safer recruitment and have now begun thinking about volunteering opportunities, role descriptions and recruitment in order to prepare for re-opening. The Safeguarding Leadership Team (Canon Pastor and two Safeguarding Co-ordinators) have met regularly at least once a month with an ongoing programme of reviewing and monitoring, which feeds into the Safeguarding Committee.

Our public facing work of Witness to Christian Faith and social engagement continued on a smaller scale. Prior to closure the Cathedral building and its Chaplaincy team were a natural place for people in the city centre to find a listening ear and signposting to practical help as required. Chaplains have continued to provide a limited service, but this has not been widely used. The Homelessness Charter and other strategic social action involvement continues apace, with the Charter having increasing impact on the City's ability to tackle the challenges around homelessness and deprivation.

We have retained a programme of school visits, operating out of St Mary de Castro and led by the Head Verger with the small but dedicated group of volunteers. However we've not sought new audiences or greatly altered the programmes on offer, preferring to wait to plan for our reopening.

The Heritage Group, which is a partnership between the three Churches, has been extremely active developing its thinking in line with LCR planning and particularly seeking wider partnerships. This is work in progress and will come to fruition particularly after re-opening, but opportunities have been grasped to capitalise on the archaeology finds, and develop our suite of walking tours, despite a closed building. Many volunteers have remained with us, despite there being little footfall. Some have represented us at the KRIII Visitor Centre, where the Pall is located and several have been extremely active in the development work mentioned.

A number of staff moved on and others were employed in 2022 resourcing Digital, Communications, Fundraising, Administration, Discipleship, work with the Junior Church and preparation for the implementation of the Cathedral's Measure. This has brought fresh perspectives and different energies to the work of the Cathedral as the organization pivoted to a different way of being Cathedral.

In October it was announced that Dean David Monteith has been appointed to be Dean of Canterbury where he was installed on 17th December with a great deal of joy. David's ministry was marked at a Diocesan service with the Bishops in St Mary de Castro, and less formally with the cathedral congregation. David's legacy of leadership through the interment of Richard II and visionary work to re-order the Cathedral first of all to bury the king, and then to make the building fit for purpose for another century, has been momentous. As senior priest in the Diocese David inspired and mentored, supported and listened to many clergy and is deeply missed.

Targeted fundraising for the Leicester Cathedral Revealed (LCR) project continued during the year, with successes including a grant secured from the Culture Recovery Fund for the external stonework repair and restoration. General fundraising for the project was reignited given financial pressures caused by the costs of archaeological works, and the initial approach to individuals towards the end of the year raised £88,750. The Guild Dinner held in October raised over £14k, a level of profitability not seen for many years. While our donation income was understandably impacted by the lack of visitor donations during the Cathedral's closure, we are again thankful for the many regular givers who remained faithful and committed to the Cathedral. Much of the work in the second half of the year, when a new Development and Engagement Manager was in post, was concerned with ensuring we have systems in place to maximise donation income when the Cathedral reopens.

The LCR project transformed the interior of the Cathedral, effected external stonework repairs and hosted the University of Leicester Archaeological Services all year.

Following the closure of the Cathedral internal works commenced. The following were completed during the year:

- Asbestos removal
- Stripping out old mechanical and electrical infrastructure, removing floor coverings and reducing the level to enable a new underfloor heating system to be installed
- Plaster repairs, paint testing, high-level redecoration works and electrical re-wiring
- Replacing the floor of the North Porch with a waterproof slab that also provides a solid ceiling to the plant room below
- Installation of new services infrastructure in the plant room

The external works completed during the year included:

- Urgent stonework repair and restoration on the south façade including installing four new grotesques and rebuilding of two buttresses on south east corner
- Ground works to form the contiguous piled wall defining the basement of the new visitor and learning centre extension

Major archaeological excavations by the University of Leicester Archaeological Services were undertaken ahead of basement construction. Significantly more intact skeletons than foreseen were discovered and the archaeological works continued beyond the end of 2022 incurring some project delay.

Weekly public archaeology excavation tours were delivered using a special viewing platform and a number of press releases and monthly reporting kept the public well informed about progress.

Cathedral architect, Ian Salisbury, retired at the end of the year after more than 20 years of committed service and was replaced by Peter Rogan.

Governance Work to implement the Cathedrals Measure began following the securing of funding from the Church Sustainability Fund (CSF) for a Senior Policy Officer. A full review of policies was undertaken and due diligence conducted for the purposes of the Charity Commission with a view to registration in mid 2023. Significant work was also undertaken to renew the Strategic Plan to integrate the LCR vision into the day to day life of the Cathedral. This was agreed and published as the year turned.

In the wider diocese Revd Saju Muthalaly was consecrated the second Bishop of Loughborough in January 2022. The diocese continued to implement the 'Shaped by God Together' change programme to establish Minster Communities (groups of parishes with a common life and shared mission. sharing a leadership team of lay and clergy leaders with an oversight priest).

The national Church of England launched a new strategic vision for a Church for the whole nation which is Jesus Christ centred, and shaped by, the five marks of mission. A church that is simpler, humbler, bolder with three priorities: to become a church of missionary disciples; to be a church where mixed church ecology is the norm, and to be a church that is younger and more diverse. The Cathedral offered a good fit with this vision, while accepting the challenge in areas that are less well developed.

2022 was another far from a normal year but through a combination of very committed staff and volunteers, congregation members, wider supporters and significant donors and foundations, we managed the Cathedral well through this liminal year. All this comes through tenacity, commitment and faith in the God whose love remains constant in whatever situations that may happen. Despite the challenges, in new and vivid ways we managed to live up to our strapline as a 'beating heart for city and county' through our worship, welcome and witness.

Financial Review

General

- 1. The Unrestricted funds in the Cathedral have decreased by £126,191 (from £498,634 to £372,443). They have also decreased in the Charitable Trust by £8,928 (from £16,058 to £7,130), and in the Music Foundation by £13,665 (£82,125 to £68,460).
- 2. The designated funds are wholly held within the Cathedral and apart from £13,370 are made up of non-investment properties (£1,730,511 clergy houses and the Visitor Centre) and £630,410 Strategic Reserve Fund.
- 3. The Restricted funds decreased by £1,139,847 and this is mainly as a result of work being funded by the Charitable Trust for the Leicester Cathedral Revealed Project. The restricted funds in the Cathedral have decreased by £111,011.
- **4.** The decrease in endowment funds of £102,778 is due to their decrease in market value.

Funds

The Cathedral and Music Foundation Funds are invested in CBF Funds with CCLA Investment Management Ltd and Brewin Dolphin.

Reserves Policy

The Chapter considers that an appropriate level of unrestricted reserves in the short term as at 31 December 2022 would be at least £461,215. This is based on an estimate of on-going unrestricted expenditure for a minimum six-month period next year based on the forecasted unrestricted expenditure for 2023 (£922,430). The current value of the undesignated, unrestricted funds as at 31 December 2022 is £372,443. Chapter can decide to undesignate the balance of £88,772 from the Strategic Reserve if required.

The Trustees of Leicester Cathedral Charitable Trust and those of the Leicester Cathedral Music Foundation consider that an appropriate level of unrestricted reserves in each of their accounts should be sufficient to cover any Governance Costs, around £7,000 and £8,300 respectively.

Cathedral Maintenance and Conservation Costs

Chapter is committed to carry out certain repairs and improvements but these will only be able to be carried out after funding has been secured. Significant work was carried out in the cathedral to prepare for the re-interment of the mortal remains of King Richard III. The money was raised by the Cathedral Charitable Trust. Chapter has also created a separate designated fund to enable it to carry out essential works identified in the Quinquennial Report.

The Quinquennial Architectural Inspection took place in 2015 with the report received in 2017. In particular it identified that significant high level stone repairs are required on the south elevation of the building. Chapter applied to the second tranche of World War I funding made available by the British Government for English cathedrals. It was successful and was awarded funds of up to £300k.

This sits within the overall vision of the Leicester Cathedral Revealed Project (LCR). Chapter have had dialogue with the Cathedral Fabric Commission for England (CFCE) who have given permission for the major works.

Future Plans

Covid 19 has been utterly disruptive making any confident consideration of trends to be largely meaningless. This has resulted in much short-term planning which has had to be adaptive to situations changing often entirely out of our control and much longer-term planning.

As a general comment, we note that the smaller English Cathedrals such as ours have managed to be agile and as they are somewhat less dependent on footfall or tourist income, they have found means to survive in 2022.

However, as 2023 began the uncertainty continued including significant questions around whether in the changed funding context brought on by Covid whether or not it is possible to raise the increased funds required to undertake Leicester Cathedral Revealed. The Project Board and Fundraising Group are formulating a plan with several possible outcomes.

Leicester Cathedral began the process to implement the new Cathedral Measure during 2023. This will implemented in June 2023 and additional staffing was required to complete this (which was received via a grant from the Cathedral Sustainability Fund). The Chapter have created a working group to co-ordinate this task chaired by Jonathan Kerry.

Consolidated accounts and report for the year ended 31st December 2022

Impact of the Coronavirus pandemic

The Coronavirus pandemic has given both the Cathedral and it's associated charities significant challenges. The Cathedral was then shut during 2022 due to the LCR project. Sunday morning services are being held at St Martin's House and weekday services in St Nicholas. Regular income from services has been minimal, leading to a fall in income. Further financial support from the Church Commissioners during this period has also helped mitigate potential operational deficits.

The impact of the above is such that operations in 2023 will be at a projected loss of £197,160.

We have been appointed as auditor under the Accounting and Reporting Regulations for English Anglican Cathedrals (December 2018) and report in accordance with the Act and relevant regulations made or having effect thereunder.

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an Auditors' Report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISAs (UK) will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

Irregularities, including fraud, are instances of non-compliance with laws and regulations. We design procedures in line with our responsibilities, outlined above, to detect material misstatements in respect of irregularities, including fraud. The extent to which our procedures are capable of detecting irregularities, including fraud is detailed below:

We communicated laws and regulations throughout the team and remained alert to any indications of non-compliance throughout the audit. We carried out specific procedures to address the risks identified. These included the following:

- Reviewing minutes of Chapter meetings, reviewing any correspondence with regulatory bodies, agreeing financial statement disclosures to underlying supporting documentation, enquiries of management.
- To address the risk of management override of controls, we carried out testing of journal entries and other adjustments for appropriateness. We reviewed systems and procedures to identify potential areas of management override risk and evaluated the business rationale of significant transactions to identify large or unusual transactions. We reviewed key authorisation procedures and decision-making processes for any unusual or one-off transactions.
- Performing analytical review to identify unexpected movement in account balances which may be indicative of fraud.

Owing to the inherent limitations of an audit, there is an unavoidable risk that we may not have detected some material misstatements in the financial statements, even though we have properly planned and performed our audit in accordance with auditing standards. NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2022

1. General information

Leicester Cathedral is governed by The Cathedrals Measure 1999. The principal address of the Cathedral is St Martins House, 7 Peacock Lane, Leicester, LE1 5PZ.

The financial statements are presented in sterling which is the functional currency of the Cathedral and rounded to the nearest £.

The significant accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all years presented unless otherwise stated.

The financial statements cover a group of entities as noted in the basis of preparation note below.

2. Accounting policies

2.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention as modified by the inclusion of fixed asset investments and property held for re-sale at market value and in accordance with the guidelines on accounting and reporting by English Anglican Cathedrals as specified by the Church Commissioners, and with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS102).

Chapter is confident that the cathedral is a 'going concern' and that it can meet all the anticipated expenditure for the foreseeable future, 12 months from the date the accounts are approved.

2.2 Basis of Consolidation

The group financial statements consolidate the accounts of Leicester Cathedral and its subsidiary undertakings, Leicester Cathedral Charitable Trust and Leicester Cathedral Music Foundation. Transactions between group entities are eliminated on consolidation. No Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) is presented for Leicester Cathedral alone as permitted by the Regulations.

2.3 Income

All income is recognised once the Cathedral has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably.

For donations, this generally means recognising the income upon receipt.

Grants are recognised when entitlement to the income is confirmed and its use clarified.

Legacies are used as requested by the benefactor and are recognised once receipt is probable.

Grants received have been used to cover expenditure as required by the conditions of the grant.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2022

2. Accounting policies (continued)

2.4 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised when an obligation or liability occurs, inclusive (where applicable) of any VAT which cannot be recovered.

Support costs have been apportioned to the specific activity to which they relate (as in previous years) although account has been taken of the changes in the way the Cathedral operates and its role within both the City and County. It has become a venue for a greater range of events and activities that has affected the way in which resources (including staff) spend their time.

2.5 Church Commissioners grants

The Church Commissioners are enabled to make various grants under the Cathedrals Measure 1999 to the Cathedral. Section 21 and 22 grants are made towards the stipend and other costs of a dean and two residentiary canons of the Cathedral. Section 23 grants are made towards the stipend of any other clerk or salary of any lay person employed in connection with the Cathedral and section 25 grants are made towards the repair of any chancel, other than that of the Cathedral, which the Cathedral is wholly or partly liable to repair.

2.6 Property

At the end of the financial year the Cathedral owned three terraced residential properties, previously known as Church House, the values of which reflect the cost of the purchase of the property and the conversion back to houses. The cost of the conversion and the purchase of 'Church House' was funded through the sale of the Deanery in 2013 and the two Canon's houses in 2014. The occupiers are provided with accommodation rent free in order to perform their duties.

In addition, it owned the Visitor Centre which is included at cost.

As required under the Cathedrals Measure, costs associated with the Leicester Cathedral Revealed project are treated as expenditure and have not been capitalised.

Properties are not depreciated as the Cathedral has a policy and practice of regular maintenance on all its properties and on the basis that its residual value is believed to be not materially less than the current book value; this is subject to an annual impairment review.

2.7 Cathedral Building and Inventory

No value has been attributed in the balance sheet to either the Cathedral building or items in the inventory prepared under the Care of Cathedrals Measure. The Insurance valuation for the Cathedral building is £40,579,000 and the contents £2,292,000. There have been no material movements in the heritage assets of the Cathedral in the last five years.

2.8 Office Equipment, Furniture and Fittings

Office equipment, furniture and fittings are held at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation has been calculated at 20% over 5 years, straight line method, in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life. The Cathedral writes off immaterial items on acquisition.

2. Accounting policies (continued)

2.9 Investments

Fixed asset investments have been inluded in the balance sheet at market value and comprise holdings in Central Board of Finance Investment Fund and Property Fund Shares together with dated government stock and quoted equity shares. The Cathedral also holds a balanced portfolio with Brewin Dolphin.

2.10 Inventories

Inventories comprises of items for resale that are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

2.11 Debtors and creditors receivable / payable within one year

Debtors and creditors with no stated interest rate and receivable or payable within one year are recorded at transaction price. Any losses arising from impairment are recognised in expenditure.

2.12 Financial instruments

The Cathedral has chosen to adopt the Sections 11 and 12 of FRS 102 in respect of financial instruments. Basic financial assets, including trade and other debtors and cash and bank balances are initially recognised at transaction price, unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest.

At the end of each reporting period financial assets measured at amortised cost are assessed for objective evidence of impairment. If an asset is impaired the impairment loss is the difference between the carrying amount and the present value of the estimated cash flows discounted at the asset's original effective interest rate. The impairment loss is recognised in the statement of financial activities.

Other financial assets, including investments in equity instruments which are not subsidiaries, associates or joint ventures, are initially measured at fair value, which is normally the transaction price.

Such assets are subsequently carried at fair value and the changes in fair value are recognised in the income statement, except that investments in equity instruments that are not publicly traded and whose fair values cannot be measured reliably are measured at cost less impairment.

Basic financial liabilities, including trade and other creditors, are initially recognised at transaction price, unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest.

Debt instruments are subsequently carried at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method.

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of business from suppliers. Accounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade creditors are recognised initially at transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

2.13 Pension Contributions

Stipendiary Clergy

Church Commissioners for England- Cathedrals participates in the Church of England Funded Pensions Scheme for stipendiary clergy, a defined benefit pension scheme. This scheme is administered by the Church of England Pensions Board, which holds the assets of the schemes separately from those of the Responsible Bodies.

Each participating Responsible Body in the scheme pays contributions at a common contribution rate applied to pensionable stipends.

The scheme is considered to be a multi-employer scheme as described in Section 28 of FRS 102. This means it is not possible to attribute the Scheme's assets and liabilities to each specific Responsible Body, and this means contributions are accounted for as if the Scheme were a defined contribution scheme. The pensions costs charged to the SoFA in the year are contributions payable towards benefits and expenses accrued in that year (2022: £30,388, 2021: £30,104).

A valuation of the Scheme is carried out once every three years. The most recent Scheme valuation completed was carried out at as 31 December 2021. The 2021 valuation revealed a surplus os £560m, based on assets of £2,720m and a funding target of £2,160m, assessed using the following assumptions:

- -An average discount rate of 2.7% p.a.;
- -RPI inflation of 3.6% p.a. (and pension increases consistent with this);
- -CPIH inflation in line with RPI less 0.8% pre 2030 moving to RPI with no adjustment from 2030 onwards:
- -Increase in pensionable stipends in line with CPIH;
- -Mortality in accordance with 90% of the S3NA tables, with allowance for improvements in mortality rates in line with the CMI2020 extended model with a long term annual rate of improvement of 1.5%, a smoothing parameter of 7, an initial addition to mortality improvements of 0.5% pa and an allowance for 2020 data of 0% (i.e. w2020=0%),

Following the 31 December 2018 valuation, a recovery plan was put in place until 31 December 2022 and the deficit recovery contributions (as a percentage of pensionable stipends) were as set out in the table below. An interim reduction to deficit contributions to 3.2% of pensionable stipends was, made with effect from 1 April 2022. Following finalisation of the 2021 valuation, deficit contributions ceased with effect from 1 January 2023, since the scheme was in surplus.

As at 31 December 2020 and 31 December 2021 the deficit recovery contributions under the recovery plan in force were as set out in the table above. For senior office holders, pensionable stipends are adjusted in the calculations by a multiple, as set out in the Scheme's rules.

Section 28.11A of FRS 102 requires agreed deficit recovery payments to be recognised as a liability.

The legal structure of the scheme is such that if another Responsible Body fails, Church Commissioners for England- Cathedrals could become responsible for paying a share of that Responsible Body's pension liabilities.

The above liabilities are for the total Scheme, and not solely for Leicester Cathedral. Under the Pension Measures, the Church Commissioners are responsible for funding the pension contributions, and therefore there is no liability for pension deficit recovery contributions recorded in the financial statements of Leicester Cathedral.

Lay staff

Leicester Cathedral (PB Classic) participates in the Pension Builder Scheme section of CWPF for lay staff. The Scheme is administered by the Church of England Pensions Board, which holds the assets of the schemes separately from those of the Employer and the other participating employers.

The Church Workers Pension Fund has a section known as the Defined Benefits Scheme, a deferred annuity section known as Pension Builder Classic and a cash balance section known as Pension Builder 2014.

2.13 Pension Contributions (continued)

Pension Builder Scheme

Both sections of the Pension Builder Scheme are classed as defined benefit schemes.

Pension Builder Classic provides a pension, accumulated from contributions paid and converted into a deferred annuity during employment based on terms set and reviewed by the Church of England Pensions Board from time to time. Discretionary increases may also be added, depending on investment returns and other factors.

Pension Builder 2014 is a cash balance scheme that provides a lump sum that members use to provide benefits at retirement. Pension contributions are recorded in an account for each member. Discretionary bonuses may be added before retirement, depending on investment returns and other factors. The account, plus any bonuses declared is payable, unreduced, from age 65.

There is no sub-division of assets between employers in each section of the Pension Builder Scheme.

The Scheme is considered to be a multi-employer scheme as described in section 28 of FRS 102. This is because it is not possible to attribute the Pension Builder Scheme's assets and liabilities to specific employers and that contributions are accounted for as if the Scheme were a defined contribution scheme. The pension costs charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the year are the contributions payable and were £27,451 (2021: £28,164).

A valuation of the scheme is carried out once every three years. The most recent scheme valuation completed was carried out as at 31 December 2019. The next valuation is due as at 31 December 2022.

For the Pension Builder Classic section, the valuation revealed a deficit of £4.8m on the ongoing assumptions used. At the most recent annual review, the Board chose to grant a discretionary bonus of 10.1% following improvements in the funding position over 2022. There is no requirement for deficit payments at the current time.

For the Pension Builder 2014 section, the valuation revealed a surplus of £5.5m on the ongoing assumptions used. There is no requirement for deficit payments at the current time.

The legal structure of the Scheme is such that if another employer fails, Leicester Cathedral may become responsible for paying a share of that employer's pension liabilities.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2022

2. Accounting policies (continued)

2.14 Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are funds which are available for use at the discretion of Chapter in furtherance of the general objectives of the Cathedral and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that have been set aside by Chapter for particular purposes. The aim and use of each designated fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the Cathedral for particular purposes. The cost of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Endowment funds represent those assets which must be held permanently by the Cathedral, principally investments. Income arising on the endowment funds can be used in accordance with the objects of the Cathedral and is included as unrestricted or restricted income. Any capital gains or losses arising on the investments form part of the fund.

2.15 Going Concern

As noted on page 16 of the trustees' report, the trustees have considered the impact of the Revealed project on the operations of the Cathedral and are satisfied that they have sufficient reserves, and plans in place to mitigate the risk presented by Revealed project, and as such they are satisfied that the Cathedral is a going concern.

27. Subsequent Events

On 27th June 2023, the first steps of the implementation of The Cathedral Measures Act 2021 came into effect. These have given rise to a restructuring of the governance of the Cathedral, although this has no financial implications for the Cathedral and does not impact the reporting in the financial statements for the year ended 31st December 2022.

It is anticipated that the next steps of the Cathedral Measures Act 2021 will be implemented from 28th September 2023 with the Cathedral falling under the regulatory jurisdiction of the Charity Commission and having to comply with the Charities Act 2011 requirements from this date.
