# Whistleblowing Policy

17/10/2022

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1.	Introduction			
1.1	The Chapter is committed to being open, honest and accountable. It encourages a free and oper culture in its dealings with people who work or volunteer for, with or within the Cathedra Tackling problems is vitally important to upholding the Cathedral's mission, vision and value safeguarding every person and protecting its resources.			
1.2	This policy aims to help people who work or volunteer for, with or within the Cathedral to ra any concerns they may have about colleagues or anything taking place in the Cathedral w confidence and without having to worry about being victimised, discriminated against disadvantaged in any way as a result.			
1.3	This policy is written in the context of the Public Interest Disclosure Act 1998 ("Act") and other legislation which protects employees and workers who 'blow the whistle' on malpractices within their organisation.			
1.4	The applicability of the Act to clergy office holders is uncertain and has not been tested in the courts. However, the Chapter has chosen to extend the same protections to clergy office holders as the Act gives to employees and workers in so far as is possible.			
1.5	In addition, as it is considered best practice for charities to choose to extend similar protections to volunteers, the Chapter has chosen to extend the same protection to volunteers in so far as is possible and to treat all individuals making a disclosure in the spirit of the Act.			
2.	Who does this policy apply to?			
2.1	This policy applies to everyone who works or volunteers for, with or within the Cathedral. This includes employees, casual and temporary workers, office holders, volunteers, interns, consultants, contractors, partner organisations and agency workers.			
3.	What is Whistleblowing?			
3.1	'Whistleblowing' refers to the internal or external disclosure of malpractice and seriou suspected wrongdoing as well as illegal acts, or omissions, at work. It covers, for example, how we raise funds, how we commission work or make payments and where there has been a breach of a legal, statutory or regulatory requirement or unethical behaviour.			
4.	What types of concerns are covered by this policy?			
4.1	To use this policy and be legally protected under the Act, you must make a disclosure about a serious concern. This is known under the Act as a 'qualifying disclosure'. This means you have information and reasonably believe that one or more of the following matters is happening, has taken place, or is likely to happen in the future:			
	<ul> <li>a) a criminal offence (including fraudulent and corrupt behaviour, e.g. theft, fraud or malpractice);</li> <li>b) a miscarriage of justice;</li> <li>c) an act creating risk to health and safety;</li> <li>d) an act causing damage to the environment;</li> <li>e) a breach of any other legal obligation; or</li> <li>f) concealment of any of the above.</li> </ul>			
4.2	You do not need to have proof that such an act is being, has been, or is likely to be, committed. You do, however, need to hold a reasonable belief of such an action having been, being or likely to be carried out.			

4.3	If you feel unable to whistle blow internally, the matter may be reported directly to the relevant regulator, such as the Charity Commission or Church Commissioners.			
5.	What concerns cannot be raised as whistleblowing under this policy?			
5.I	This policy does not apply to:			
5.1.1	Complaints: A complaint that is an expression of your dissatisfaction which calls for a response If you want to make a complaint about the Cathedral you should use our Complaints Policy.			
5.1.2	Safeguarding concerns: For safeguarding concerns please refer to our Safeguarding Pol However, if your concerns are about whether or not our Safeguarding Policy has been appl or observed, you may raise them under this policy.			
5.1.3	Concerns about other organisation: If you have concerns about the behaviour of anot organisation, you should raise them through that organisation, following any whistleblow procedures it has.			
5.1.4	Employment related concerns: This policy does not deal with any complaints employees may have about their own employment position, which should be addressed through the procedures in the Cathedral's Employee Handbook.			
5.2	If you are uncertain whether your concerns are within the scope of this policy, you may seek advice from the Whistleblowing Officer whose contact details are in paragraph 6.5.			
6.	How to raise a concern			
6.1	You should raise your whistleblowing concern as soon as possible. This will make it easier to act and to enable any problems to be resolved or reported quickly.			
6.2	You can make your disclosure orally but written disclosures are preferable as these will make the process more efficient and effective. In your disclosure, you should:			
	a) provide any relevant context and background, including relevant dates, venues, names etc.; and			
	b) state clearly the reason why the situation causes for concern.			
6.3	You must say that you are raising your concern using the whistleblowing policy and whether you wish your identity to be kept confidential. While we will make every effort to deal with your can confidentially, depending on the circumstances of the case this may not always be possible (e.g. the police are involved). Where this is the case, you will be informed of this and the reasons we it was not possible. We prefer non-anonymous disclosures, as anonymity often makes it difficut to properly investigate concerns, protect employees or give feedback on outcomes.			
6.4	The Chief Operating Officer (or in the absence of whom the Dean) is designated to handle whistleblowing concerns in the Cathedral and is the Cathedral's Whistleblowing Officer.			
6.5	You should report your concern in the first instance to your line manager/volunteer co-ordinator where appropriate, or to the Whistleblowing Officer by email at <u>Cathedral@LeicesterCofE.org</u> . If the matter concerns the Whistleblowing Officer, it should be raised with the Dean.			
6.6	If you are unsure whether to use this procedure, or you want independent advice at any st you should contact your trade union or an independent organisation such as Protect.			

7.	Protecting the individual raising the concern	
7.1	If you raise a concern which you believe to be true, the Chapter will take appropriate action to protect you from any harassment, victimisation or bullying. Employees and workers who raise a genuine concern under this policy will not be at risk of losing their job, nor will it influence any unrelated disciplinary action or redundancy procedures.	
7.2	The matter will be treated confidentially but if the concern cannot be resolved without revealing your identity, the Whistleblowing Officer will discuss with you whether and how to proceed.	
7.3	You should note that you will not be protected from the consequences of making a disclosure if, by doing so, you commit a criminal offence.	
8.	How will the Chapter deal with the concern?	
8.1	How the concern will be dealt with, will depend on what it involves. It is likely that furth enquiries and/or investigation will be necessary. The concern may be investigated by t Whistleblowing Officer, through the disciplinary process or it may be referred to the polic Diocesan Safeguarding Adviser, a regulator, other agencies, an external auditor or an independent investigator.	
8.2	Typically, the matters raised may result in one or more of the following:	
	a) no action required;	
	b) action being taken under another policy or procedure;	
	c) an internal investigation under this policy;	
	d) a referral to the police or other relevant statutory body;	
	e) referral to the Church Commissioners;	
	f) a referral to the Cathedral's external auditors;	
	g) a Serious Incident Report being made to the Charity Commission (see the Cathedral's Serious Incident Reporting Process for further guidance); or	
	h) an independent inquiry.	
8.3	It may be necessary for you to give evidence in criminal or disciplinary proceedings.	
8.4	The Whistleblowing Officer will give you feedback on the progress and outcome of an investigation, wherever possible.	
9.	Allegations that are malicious or known to the individual making them to be false	
9.1	If it is found that you have knowingly or maliciously made an untrue allegation or you are invol in any way in the malpractice, wrongdoing or illegal acts or omissions, the Chapter will t appropriate action in accordance with the appropriate policy.	
9.2	If the suspicions are not confirmed by an investigation, the matter will be closed and a re- retained. Any person raising a concern under this policy will not suffer any detriment for ra the concern unless they are found to have made a malicious allegation.
